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Dear People,

This newsletter contains more resources for getting together for racial, gender, and economic justice. It highlights the work of four organizations working with ally groups to support grassroots communities. Each group, **Hand in Hand**: the Domestic Employer Network, **Resource Generation**, a network of young adults (20-35) with wealth, **Showing Up for Racial Justice** (SURJ), educating, mobilizing, and training white people to be effective anti-racist activists, and the **White Noise Collective** which educates and mobilizes white women for racial justice work. These groups provide resources for making Black lives and the lives of other people of color matter in specific and practical ways. As these organizations indicate, there are multiple ways to get involved. Now is the right time to add your contribution to moving the racial justice agenda forward. ## Hand in Hand: The Domestic Employers Network

**Hand in Hand** is a national network of employers of nannies, housecleaners and home attendants, and other domestic workers who know that fair and respectful working conditions benefit worker and employer alike. Hand in Hand, working closely with the **National Domestic Workers Alliance**, supports such employers to improve their employment practices, and to collaborate with workers to change cultural norms and public policies that bring dignity and respect to domestic workers.

# Resource Generation: Guidance for Giving to Organizing for Black Liberation

**Resource Generation** is a nonprofit organizing young Americans with wealth and class privilege to be leaders in the move toward worldwide equity. They have provided some

guidance on how to best support the movement for Black lives and Black liberation, along with a list of over 170 organizations that meet their guidelines. A few of the guidelines are below, please click over to [their site](#) to read more.



"Organizing for Black liberation...

- Seeks to change and shift cultural narratives, media coverage, historical accounts, and our collective psyche toward valuing all Black lives.
- Centers and celebrates the lives of marginalized Black people. This includes transgender and genderqueer; gay, lesbian, bisexual, and queer identified; incarcerated or institutionalized; poor; disabled and differently abled; women and girls alongside men and boys; those in rural and urban areas; and others who are often overlooked in both funding and broad-based movement struggles.
- Has Black people in key leadership positions with significant decision-making power, and develops and supports Black leadership. This means different things in different locations and organizations (for non-profits this could be a majority of the Board of Directors, Executive Director, and member-leaders). The key is that ending anti-Black racism is central to the mission and strategies of the work (which necessarily includes strong Black leadership); organizations that are multi-racial or multi-issue and have a clear focus on ending anti-Black racism at all levels fit this criteria..."

## SURJ - Showing Up For Racial Justice

**SURJ--Showing Up for Racial Justice** is a network of organizations and individuals including dozens of chapters around the country founded by people dedicated to increasing the number and effectiveness of white people supporting people of color led racial justice struggles.



Through community organizing, mobilizing,

and education, SURJ moves white people to act as part of a multi-racial majority for justice with passion and accountability. It provides action kits, educational materials and other resources, national calls, and base-building training for local groups starting or continuing to support grassroots-led racial justice campaigns.

## White Noise Collective



**White Noise Collective** describes themselves as "a collective of people who (mostly) identify as female and who have experienced the world with white skin privilege who are informed and inspired by the intersectional analyses of influential Black feminist theorists as well as the work of our antiracist white ancestors."

They "share a vision of working toward a world in which all people who experience gendered oppression and white/light skin privilege will feel inspired, empowered, and equipped to act up and be fiercely and creatively committed to social justice and racial justice movements, especially those led by people of color."






**Why Black Lives Haven't Mattered: The Origins of Racism in Christian Hegemony**




Christianity blessed slavery at every step of the trade. For example, in present-day Ghana, a small church for baptizing Africans before they were taken onto ships was situated above Elmina Castle's slave pens. Many of the ships had names such as Jesus, Good Ship Jesus, Angel, Grace of God, Christ the Redeemer, Blessed, John Evangelist, The Lord Our Savior and Trinity.

### Christian Hegemony and the Architects of Anti-Trans Violence

Cole does an excellent job of showing how dominant Christian leaders, denominations, and parachurch organizations such as think tanks and legal organizations work together to create and activate a national agenda. The article focuses on coordinated attacks against the transgender community by organizations also involved in anti-gay, anti-choice, and other campaigns.*



### The Impact of Catholic Hospitals on Women's Reproductive Rights



*Catholic hospitals were originally established by nuns and monks to minister to the poor - Catholic dominance in health care delivery is often justified by the contention that it is a community service and much charitable care is provided for the indigent. However, Catholic provided charitable care is no greater than that provided by secular non-profit or for-profit hospitals (between 2-3%) and is only half of what public hospitals provide (5.6%).*

### Atheists in the United States


*I heard many accounts of the marginalization and attack of Atheists by Christians at the American Atheist conference. These are experienced not just by people who live in the South (where we were in Memphis, TN in the buckle of the Bible Belt and on Easter weekend no less) or Midwest, but also by folks in rural areas and large cities across the country.*

### ***EVERYDAY WHITE PEOPLE CONFRONT RACIAL & SOCIAL JUSTICE***




In this compilation of the stories of fifteen White anti-racist activists, Paul's chapter begins:

"My work grows out of 45 years of living in community, raising children, working with various social service and social justice organizations, and doing education, activism and writing all focused on one primary question. How can we live and work together to sustain community, nurture each individual, and create a multicultural society based on love, caring, justice, and interdependence with all life? I still don't know the answer to that question. But I feel more strongly than ever that it poses the most important challenge we face in the world today."


### ***SOME MEN: FEMINIST ALLIES & THE MOVEMENT TO END VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN***



From the description: Based on life history interviews with men and women anti-violence activists aged 22 to 70, *Some Men* explores the strains and tensions of men's work as feminist allies. When feminist women began to mobilize against rape and domestic violence, setting up shelters and rape crisis centers, a few men asked what they could do to help. They were directed "upstream," and told to "talk to the men" with the goal of preventing future acts of violence. This is a book about men who took this charge seriously, committing themselves to working with boys and men to stop violence, and to change the definition of what it means to be a man.
